While it is an important part of the program to meet with scholars, writers and politicians, who deal with issues of immigration and integration, we have put a strong emphasis on providing opportunities to meet people, who face, suffer from, or overcome, problems arising from the actual situation of immigrants in France and Germany. You will be able to talk to teachers, social workers, and representatives of religious communities. We will introduce you to examples of economic well-being, as well as to urban situations illustrating the dangers of unsuccessful integration. There will be plenty of opportunities to forge links beneficial to your further work and research, and we are confident that the seminar experience will be rewarding to you both professionally, and personally.

Dr. Najia Aarim-Heriot is a social historian, whose teaching and research interests focus on ethnicity and race. After graduating from the Université de Grenoble (France), she taught British and American Studies at the Université Moulay Ismaïl (Morocco). She obtained her Ph.D. from Temple University in American history in 1996. She is currently an Associate Professor of history at SUNY-Fredonia, teaching African-American and Asian-American history courses. She is the author of *Chinese Immigrants, African Americans, and Racial Anxiety in the United States, 1848-1882* (2003), and is presently engaged in research on the evolution of the racial order in the Americas and curriculum development in multiethnic studies.



Dr. Emily Askew received her Ph.D in Religion from Vanderbilt University in August 2004. She is presently Assistant Professor of Religion and Society at Carroll College in Waukesha, Wisconsin. Her primary research is in two areas of contemporary theological thought: 1) theology, space and environment and 2) theology and postcolonial theory. Her primary teaching interests are women in Islam and the depictions of Islam in Western media. As a religious studies teacher, she is committed to dismantling her students' totalizing and often demonizing assumptions about Islam, gleaned from Western media. This Fulbright affords her a wonderful opportunity to expand this dialogue with her students and colleagues.



Dr. Rita Chin is on the history faculty at the University of Michigan. She teaches courses on comparative migration, transnationalism, Muslim immigrant communities, and race and ethnicity in contemporary Europe. Her work brings the study of ethnic minorities into the center of modern German and European history. She has recently finished a book, The Guest Worker Question: Debating Diversity in Postwar West Germany, forthcoming with Cambridge University Press. Her new project examines the cultural politics of migration in postwar Germany, Britain, and France and considers the ways in which nationally-specific frameworks for migration shaped the conditions for activism, claims-making, and integration.



Dr. Christopher Clark is Assistant
Professor/Faculty Fellow in the Department of
German at New York University. He earned a
Ph.D. in German Studies at Cornell University
in 2003. His first book project (currently under
editorial review), Germany at the Margins:
Sexuality, Race, and Culture since 1968, examines
the intersections of marginalized sexualities and
other axes of alterity (ethnic, national, etc.) in
German culture. He is currently at work on
a second book project examining fascism and
sexuality in contemporary German literature,
film, and culture.



Dr. Peter E. Doerschler currently serves as an Assistant Professor of Politics at Loras College in Dubuque, Iowa. His primary teaching and research interests include comparative and international politics with an emphasis on European politics and immigration. His most recent research has examined the political integration of immigrants in Germany, focusing in particular on the origins and development of immigrants' political attitudes and behavior. Within this rather broad topic, he is most interested in the role played by socialization and citizenship in shaping immigrants' attitudes toward government.



Ms. Melanie Dreyer graduated from Northwestern University with an MFA in Directing. She is the former Co-Artistic Director of *ShatterMask Theater*, a critically acclaimed theatre specializing in exploring alternatives to traditional modes of production. Fluent in German, she translates and directs contemporary German plays, and directs professionally in Germany. International collaborations include work with Russia, Germany, and Argentina. She has been directing and acting for the stage and screen in the US for twenty years. As an Assistant Professor, she runs the Performance Pedagogy and Performance Training programs at the University of Pittsburgh.



Dr. Mohamed Esa earned his Ph.D. from the University of Heidelberg. He is Associate Professor of German at McDaniel College in Maryland. He hosts numerous cultural appreciation events each year, the biggest being German-American Day when 1,000 secondary school teachers and students come to campus. He also organizes a Taste of Islam dinner each year during Ramadan. Esa's dedication to teaching, as well as his research with classroom technology and innovative language instruction using music, have been widely recognized. He is president of the Maryland Foreign Language Association. In 1999, he was awarded The Federal Republic of Germany Friendship Award, and in 2000, the Certificate of Merit.



Dr. Terri E. Givens is an Associate Professor in the Government Department at the University of Texas at Austin. She is also Director of the Center for European Studies and Director of the France-UT Institute for Interdisciplinary Studies. She received her Ph.D. from the University of California, Los Angeles, and her B.A. from Stanford University. Her academic interests include radical right parties, immigration politics, and the politics of race in Europe. Her book, *Voting Radical Right in Western Europe*, was published in Fall 2005 with Cambridge University Press. Her articles have appeared in Comparative Political Studies, the Policy Studies Journal, and Comparative European Politics.



Dr. Amy Harper is currently an Assistant Professor of Anthropology at Central Oregon Community College and a Courtesy Instructor for the University of Oregon, Bend Programs. She received her PhD from the University of Massachusetts-Amherst in 2002. Her Dissertation, "In the Shadow of the Other: Explorations of German Identity in the Construction of Difference" was based on field work funded by a Fulbright Student Grant. While her teaching interests are broadly anthropological, her research interests revolve around issues of identity, race/ethnicity, and gender, specifically within the context of Europe.



Dr. Maureen Healy is an Assistant Professor of European History at Oregon State University. Her research focuses on the social and cultural history of Central Europe. Her book, Vienna and the Fall of the Habsburg Empire: Total War and Everyday Life in World War I (Cambridge University Press, 2004) was awarded the 2005 Herbert Baxter Adams Prize from the American Historical Association and the 2005 Barbara Jelavich Book Prize from the American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies. Her current research project is entitled "At the Gates of Western Civilization: Islam and the Turks in Central European Historical Memory." She received her Ph.D. from the University of Chicago in 2000.



Dr. Pamela Irving Jackson, Rhode Island College Sociology Professor and Justice Studies Program Director, joined the faculty in 1974, after receiving a B.A. from Regis College, and the M.A. and Ph.D. from Brown University. Her research has focused on issues of social control and minority status, resulting in articles published in the *American Sociological Review*, *Criminology, Justice Quarterly* and other journals, as well as her 1989 book, *Minority Group Threat, Crime and Policing*, a Choice Outstanding Academic Book. Professor Jackson has served on the editorial board of the *American Sociological Review*, and received teaching and research awards at RIC in 2000 and 2003.



Dr. Damani Partridge is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Anthropology and at the Center for Afro-American and African Studies at the University of Michigan. In addition to teaching both undergraduate and graduate courses on "Race and Displacement," "Citizenship and Non-Citizens," "Urban Anthropology," "The Races of Sexuality and the Sexualities of Race," "Diasporic Aesthetics," and "The Anthropology of Europe," he is currently completing the revisions for his book manuscript: Becoming non-citizens: Technologies of Exclusion and Exclusionary Incorporation after the Berlin Wall.




Dr. Marilya Veteto Reese, born in Oklahoma/ USA, also spent her childhood not far from New York City, in Hamburg, in Stockholm, and in Houston. She attended Austin College, Freie Universität Berlin and The University of Texas at Austin. Her teaching career began at Austin College as a Peer Teacher in 1979, and she completed her doctorate in 1990 at UT Austin. Dr. Reese holds the rank of Full Professor at Northern Arizona University, where her areas of specialization are minority literature in Germany, foreign language pedagogy and translation. She is the Southwest representative member of the AATG's Executive Committee.



Dr. Mark A. Reid is currently Professor of English at the University of Florida and Director of Film and Media Studies. He received his B.A. in English from Columbia University in 1977, and an M.A. in Communications and Theater at the University of Illinois-Chicago in 1979. At the University of Iowa, Dr. Reid obtained a second M.A. degree in American Studies (1985) and a Ph.D. in American Studies in 1988. Currently, he is working on a project that will serve as an extension of his *PostNegritude Visual and Literary Culture* (1997) by offering a comparative analysis of contemporary French Cinema.



Dr. Richard Schur is Director and Assistant Professor of Interdisciplinary Studies at Drury University. His teaching and research explores contemporary African American culture and its relationship to American law. His articles have been published in legal, literary, and cultural studies journals. Schur coordinates Drury's global studies general education program and won a grant (with Jayne White) to enable Drury to participate in the Association of American Colleges and Universities' (AACU) Global Learning and General Education project. He is currently completing a book manuscript entitled *Parodies of Ownership: Hip Hop Aesthetics and Intellectual Property Law*.



Dr. Zachary Shore is a Research Scholar at UC Berkeley's Institute of European Studies. Previously he served on the Policy Planning Staff at the U.S. Department of State, where he specialized in transatlantic relations. He earned his doctorate in modern European history from Oxford University and served as a National Security Fellow at Harvard's Olin Institute for Strategic Studies. Shore's first book, What Hitler Knew: The Battle for Information in Nazi Foreign Policy (Oxford University Press, 2003), examined foreign-policy decision making inside Hitler's Reich. Shore's second book, Breeding Bin Ladens: America, Islam and the Future of Europe, is forthcoming from Johns Hopkins University Press.



Dr. Hilary Silver is Associate Professor of Sociology and Urban Studies at Brown University, where she has taught since receiving her Ph.D. in Sociology from Columbia University. Her research centers on social exclusion, poverty, inequality, and discrimination. She is currently finishing a book on grassroots initiatives to combat social exclusion in France and Germany. In addition, she is editing a book on the impact of new immigrants on the cities of New England, and is making a film about neighborhood change in Providence, RI. She co-organizes a study group on social exclusion at Harvard's Center for European Studies.



Dr. Roland Spickermann received his BA from UC Berkeley in 1984 and his Ph.D. from Michigan in 1994. His dissertation with Geoff Eley concerned the Germans in an ethnically mixed area of the German Empire caught between Polish nationalism, a declining economy, and the internal conflicts caused by governmental social-restructuring programs. He is now researching the history of adoption in Germany. He is an Associate Professor at the University of Texas - Permian Basin in Odessa, Texas, where he teaches modern German, European, and Chinese history, as well as graduate courses on industrialization, democratization, and nationalism.



Dr. Michelle Stewart is Coordinator and Assistant Professor of Cinema Studies and Literature at Purchase College in New York. Her scholarship centers on interdisciplinary questions of cinema's relation to changing forms of sociality and political life under globalization. She received her PhD in Comparative Studies in Discourse and Society from the University of Minnesota. Her dissertation, "Sovereign Visions: Native North American Documentary," investigates the development of Native North American filmmaking as a creative form of cultural activism that is tied to a political program of cultural revival, self-determination, and national sovereignty. With Pam Wilson, she is coeditor of the forthcoming collection: Global Indigenous Media.



Dr. Eileen Trzcinski is Professor and Director of Research in the School of Social Work at Wayne State University. She received her Ph.D. in Economics and Social Work from the University of Michigan. A specialist in family economic policy, her current research interests are family and medical leave policy, immigration policy, and the effects of maternal employment on child and adolescent development. Her work has a strong cross-national component, with particular emphasis on the United States, Canada, Poland and Germany. She has worked as a visiting scholar at the German Institute for Economic Research, the Institute for the Study of Labor in Bonn, the Warsaw School of Economics and in Krakow.
